



Bachelor of Laws 2008
Course code 2708 (192 points of Law units)

The Bachelor of Laws (LLB) requires students to complete 192 credit points of study consisting of 12 compulsory units (72 points) and a further 120 credit points of elective units.

The units listed below are known as the 'quasi-compulsory' units. Students do not need to complete these units to obtain their LLB so technically, they are elective units. However, students who wish to practice law in Victoria must complete the following units as part of their law electives(*):

Students who have, prior to admission to the LLB, successfully completed a minimum of 48 credit points of bachelor-degree-level study (or equivalent) in a discipline other than law at Monash University or another university may receive 36 credit points of unspecified credit towards the LLB. This will reduce the requirements for the LLB to 156 credit points of study and may allow students to complete the program in three years of full time study. ^oThe 156 credit point alternative is for students who have completed a minimum of 48 credit points (or equivalent) of bachelor-degree-level study in a discipline other than law at Monash University or another university, prior to commencement of their Bachelor of Laws studies.
